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1 OVERVIEW

1.1 Background

The purpose of the ground beetle abundance and diversity sampling design is to capture inter- and intra-annual variation of the ground beetle (*Coleoptera: Carabidae*) community in the NEON purview. Ground beetles were chosen as a focal terrestrial invertebrate taxon for several reasons, including that they: are easy to sample and well known taxonomically, are relatively common in many habitats, form well-defined species richness gradients across North America, and are useful as indicators of environmental change due to their sensitivity to habitat disturbance. In addition, ground beetles can strongly influence trophic structure, both because they are generally predacious (thereby influencing prey populations) and because they are consumed by other predators (thereby influencing predator populations). As such, changes in ground beetle populations may alter proportions of various other guilds in a community. A full justification for the inclusion of ground beetle sampling in the NEON framework is provided in the TOS Science Design for Ground Beetle Abundance and Diversity (AD[06]).

The following sub-sections contain protocols that provide detailed guidance for setting pitfall traps in TOS Distributed Plots. Pitfall traps serve to capture ground-dwelling invertebrates (insects and their allies, e.g., spiders, scorpions) that fall into the traps. The animals that fall into the trap become preserved by a liquid mixture of DNA-safe preservative in the bottom of the trap. Animals that are collected in these traps but are not ground beetles are termed "bycatch." In addition, this protocol describes laboratory processing and storage of the collected animals. Information regarding the shipment of specimens or samples to contracted experts for morphological identifications, and for Genetic Analytical Laboratories for DNA sequencing is provided in TOS Protocol and Procedure: Ground Beetle and Mosquito Specimen Processing (RD[06]).

1.2 Scope

This document provides a change-controlled version of Observatory protocols and procedures. Documentation of content changes (i.e. changes in particular tasks or safety practices) will occur via this change-controlled document, not through field manuals or training materials.

1.2.1 NEON Science Requirements and Data Products

This protocol fulfills Observatory science requirements that reside in NEON's Dynamic Object-Oriented Requirements System (DOORS). Copies of approved science requirements have been exported from DOORS and are available in NEON's document repository, or upon request.

Execution of this protocol procures samples and/or generates raw data satisfying NEON Observatory scientific requirements. These data and samples are used to create NEON data products, and are documented in the NEON Scientific Data Products Catalog (RD[03]).

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3 METHOD

Ground beetle sampling, as detailed here, involves: preparation for sampling (SOP A); pitfall trap deployment (SOP B) and the collection of ground beetles (SOP C); processing samples in the lab to sort target taxa (ground beetles) from invertebrate and vertebrate bycatch (SOP D) and then identify individuals to species and properly preserve specimens (SOP E); and data entry and verification (SOP F). Additional ground beetle-related data will be gathered when tissues from a subset of specimens are sent to external facilities for identification and DNA barcode analysis, with details for these procedures provided in the TOS Protocol and Procedure: Ground Beetle and Mosquito Specimen Processing (RD[06])).

The pitfall trap design consists of two 16 oz deli containers (7 cm deep with an 11 cm diameter, 540 mL total volume) nestled within one another. One container ensures that the hole stays in the ground and enables efficient collection and resetting of the trap. This lower container has holes drilled into it so that any excess moisture can drain rather than build up and cause the top container to float. The second container has lines at the 150 and 250 mL marks and contains the preserving fluid. This top container is picked up and changed during sampling. A cover protects the container from weather (e.g., dilution from rain, drying from sun).

The preserving fluid used in the pitfall traps is a 1:1 mixture of distilled water and propylene glycol (abbreviated PG). Propylene glycol is a non-toxic antifreeze (SDS: mild irritant, non-toxic).

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


Figure 1. Standard beetle plot layout

Pitfall traps are placed on the edges of the 40m x 40m Distributed Plots (well outside of the 20m x 20m plot interior, where plant sampling will occur). Ten Distributed Plots will each have four pitfall traps (40 traps total per site) located as close as possible to the center of each of the four edges of the plot (20 meters from the center of the plot on the north, south, east, and west edges). In the diagram below (**Figure 1**), pitfall traps in a distributed plot are represented by circles labeled "B" for beetles. Plots for pitfall sampling will be identified prior to the field season.

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Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), in Section 7 of this document, provide detailed step-by-step directions, contingency plans, sampling tips, and best practices for implementing this sampling procedure. To properly collect and process samples, field technicians **must** follow the protocol and associated SOPs. Use NEON's problem reporting system to resolve any field issues associated with implementing this protocol.

The value of NEON data hinges on consistent implementation of protocols across all NEON domains. It is therefore essential that field personnel carry out this protocol as outlined in this document. In the event that local conditions create uncertainty about carrying out these steps, it is critical that technicians document the problem and enter it in NEON's problem tracking system.

The procedures described in this protocol will be audited according to the Field Audit Plan (AD[07]). Additional quality assurance will be performed on data collected via these procedures according to the NEON Data and Data Product Quality Assurance and Control Plan (AD[08]).

4 SAMPLING SCHEDULE

4.1 Sampling Frequency and Timing

Pitfall traps will be checked, emptied, and reset every 14 days. For example, if a plot is visited on a Thursday morning for the first sampling bout, it must be visited every other Thursday (morning) subsequently, so that the samples from each bout are directly comparable (i.e., beetles are collected over the same time intervals). The selected day of the week is discretionary; however, the sampling should occur consistently every 2 weeks for the entire field season, on the same day of the week, and within 12 hours of the previous time sampled.

4.2 Criteria for Determining Onset and Cessation of Sampling

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


Figure 2. Schedule for pitfall trap deployment and collection during a sampling season. Trapping occurs continuously throughout the growing season and traps are checked every 14 days. The length of the growing season varies among sites (see APPENDIX D for domain-specific estimated dates for onset and cessation of sampling).

Ground beetles should be sampled during the growing season, when biological activity is highest. The start and end of sampling each season will be triggered by biologically relevant thresholds. Sampling should begin within 2 weeks of the 10-day running average low temperature being > 4 °C (as determined by domain staff). Sampling should end when the 10-day running average low temperature is < 4 °C (see **Figure 2** for schematic of ground beetle sampling throughout a season). Estimated dates for onset and cessation of sampling are provided, per domain, in **APPENDIX D**.

4.3 Timing for Laboratory Processing and Analysis

Following the collection of each pitfall trap, its contents must undergo an ethanol rinse (see **SOP D**) within 24 hours. Additional processing (e.g., sorting (**SOP D**, **SOP E**, **SOP F**), pinning and identifying (**SOP G**)) may be conducted at a later date, when there is sufficient time and personnel for such activities. These activities may occur several months after sample collection, although all beetle processing must be completed within four months of the end of the field season.

4.4 Sampling Timing Contingencies

When unexpected field conditions require deviations from the field protocols outlined in this document, contingent decisions, outlined in **Table 1** below, should be followed in the interest of maintaining data quality. The table describes how to respond to delays in the sampling schedule (including delayed trap collection and/or reset) and explains some of the consequences of sampling delays. It is important to determine the site schedule (e.g. controlled burns, grazing rotation) at the outset of each season to ensure that traps are not damaged by site activities, if possible.

¹ This situation may occur if, for example, technicians went to collect traps, found that there were one or more damaged traps, and did not have the necessary equipment to replace and re-set the damaged traps.



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5 SAFETY

This document identifies procedure-specific safety hazards and associated safety requirements. It does not describe general safety practices or site-specific safety practices.

Personnel working at a NEON site must be compliant with safe field work practices as outlined in the Operations Field Safety and Security Plan (AD[02]) and EHS Safety Policy and Program Manual (AD[01]). Additional safety issues associated with this field procedure are outlined below. The Field Operations Manager and the Lead Field Technician have primary authority to stop work activities based on unsafe field conditions; however, all employees have the responsibility and right to stop their work in unsafe conditions.

Safety Data Sheets (SDS) are available for the following chemicals used in this work: propylene glycol, ethanol, and paradichlorobenzene (moth crystals). Whenever chemicals are used, follow requirements of the site-specific Chemical Hygiene and Biosafety Plan (AD[03]).

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6.2 Training Requirements

All technicians must complete required safety training as defined in the NEON Training Plan (AD[04]). Additionally, technicians must complete protocol-specific training for safety and implementation of this protocol as required in Field Operations Job Instruction Training Plan (AD[05]).

Training for field techs will include practice analyzing datasheets at various levels of completion or with errors. Training will also include discussions on how to interpret the data, the importance of uploading data in a timely fashion, and how to recognize the distinction between missing data and true zeroes.

Field technicians (regular and seasonal) who are responsible for leading implementation of this protocol are required to attend all associated training presentations as well as read related documentation (training materials and protocols).

6.3 Specialized Skills

Prior experience collecting ground beetles or working with related insects (i.e., entomological fieldwork) is desirable but not required. Personnel should have good fine motor skill for handling individual specimens and pinning/pointing.

6.4 Estimated Time

The time required to implement a protocol will vary depending on a number of factors, such as skill level, system diversity, environmental conditions, and distance between sample plots. The timeframe provided below is an estimate based on completion of a task by a skilled two-person team (i.e., not the time it takes at the beginning of the field season). Use this estimate as framework for assessing progress. If a task is taking significantly longer than the estimated time, a problem ticket should be submitted.

Sampling is estimated to require 2 technicians: 12 min per trap x 40 traps = 480 min = 4 hours per person each day of sampling; 30 min per plot x 10 plots = 300 min = 5 total hours each day of driving; and 15 min x 10 plots = 150 min = 2.5 total hours each day of hiking. Exact drive and hike times will vary by site, and should be considered when deciding whether 1 or 2 teams of 2 technicians are required for sampling.



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7 STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES

SOP A Preparing for Sampling

A.1 Preparations for the first sampling period (see APPENDIX B, APPENDIX C for quick references and checklists):

- 1. Identify the locations of sampling plots and access routes
- 2. Prepare pitfall trap materials, including required labels
- 3. Cut/drill holes in bottom container
- 4. Draw 150 mL and 250 mL fill lines on top container
- 5. Locate other trap materials including pitfall trap spacers to hold up cover and filter squares.
- 6. Review/prepare checklist of materials needed for pitfall sampling.

A.2 Prior to a sampling bout:

- 1. Prepare bench and fume hood space in the lab for the preparation of field materials (e.g., ethanol, PG). Ensure that space in freezer, refrigerator or flammable materials cabinet is available for samples. Coordinate with potentially conflicting activities (e.g. soil sieving).
- 2. Assemble field equipment at least one day prior to field sampling.
- 3. Print blank datasheets (see Ground Beetle Field Datasheet in (RD[05]).
- 4. Prepare locality labels (see **APPENDIX I**).
- 5. Charge all electronic equipment (e.g., PDA, GPS unit).
- 6. Prepare one liter bottles of propylene glycol:deionized water solution (500 mL PG:500 mL water). A minimum of six 1 L bottles of this solution is required to fill 40 pitfall traps with 150 mL of preserving fluid. Be sure to prepare more of this solution than you think you will need in the field to ensure that there will still be enough to set or reset pitfall traps in the case of accidental spillages, etc.
- 7. In fume hood, prepare 95% ethanol for the field by pouring it into 1 gal narrow mouth and 1 L wide mouth bottles.
- 8. Prepare deionized water for the field by pouring it into 1 L wide mouth bottles.



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SOP B Initial Deployment of Pitfall Traps

Pitfall traps are deployed at ground level with the lip of the container flush with the ground.

See **APPENDIX B**, **APPENDIX C** for quick references and checklists pertaining to preparing for and conducting trap deployment.

- 1. Locate the first plot where sampling is to occur.
- 2. Determine the first trap location by moving 20 m north of the center plot marker. Use a Rangefinder and measuring tape to verify that your position is correct, and orient yourself between the corner markers, in the middle of the northern edge of the plot. If there is a natural feature (e.g., a rock or stream) in the target trap location, move ±2m to the east, west, or south of the targeted location. You may not place the trap outside of the plot boundaries, due to permitting constraints.
- 3. Dig a small hole with a soil knife to accommodate the pitfall trap (**Figure 3**). Start small because it is much easier to enlarge the hole than fill in the edges to maintain a tight fit. Outline the container in the dirt and then dig just inside the line to ensure a snug fit. The exact tools most useful for this step will vary based on soil type, roots, rocks, etc.

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
4. If the ground is particularly rocky or hard, use a template pitfall trap lid and spikes to prebore (with a hammer) the holes for the spikes in the actual trap.



- 5. Push the bottom container (with holes) into the hole. Slide the top container into bottom container. Ensure that the lip of the top container is flush with the ground so no lip is sticking up above the ground surface (this ensures that insects fall into the trap rather than walk around it, and accumulate in the top container only). Also ensure that there is no gap between the containers and the ground. The containers should fit snugly into the hole.
- 6. Use the pre-drawn line to fill the top container with 150 mL of PG:water solution. See contingency section (4.4) above if you have failed to bring an adequate amount of PG to fill pitfalls. If it is not possible to fill all traps to the 150 mL volume (e.g., spilled in field), revisit traps with additional preserving fluid in the following days. If re-visitation is not possible, and the amount of PG was insufficient to preserve specimens captured during the bout, the data from this trap are lost for this sampling bout.
 - a. Note comparability between samples relies on sufficient preserving solution in each pitfall trap. Bring more preserving fluid out to the field than you anticipate using.
- 7. Position cover with four plastic spikes and PVC spacers (**Figure 4-Figure 6**) so that it is visually level and 1.5 cm above the surface of the containers (**Figure 6**).
 - a. Optional step: label the top of the cover with N, S, E or W to indicate the trap location within the plot. This may facilitate matching locality labels with traps during subsequent visits

Trap cover deployment will vary based on local topography and vegetation cover. Keep the following purposes of the cover in mind while installing the cover:

- a. preventing vertebrate bycatch while allowing ground beetles to enter,
- b. shading the trap to lower fluid temperature, thus reducing evaporative loss and decomposition rate, and
- c. preventing precipitation accumulation in the trap, thus reducing dilution of the preserving fluid.




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Figure 4. Positioning cover over pitfall trap. Note the pitfall is not sufficiently dug into the ground in this image. The lip should not stick up from the ground.

- b. Moving clockwise, the second trap is 20 m east, the third is 20 m south, and the fourth is 20 m west of the center plot marker. If possible, reuse the same holes for pitfall traps from year to year (backfilled holes can be excavated anew each year).
- c. For each trap, record the date in the setDate field of the PDA or on the field datasheet.



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SOP C Field Sampling

C.1 Collecting samples from the trap

Upon arrival at the trap:

- 1. Record data on the same datasheet as used when setting the traps (see Ground Beetle Field Datasheet in (RD[05]), or find the trap activity record on the PDA.
- 2. Note the relative fluid level remaining in the container (high, low, or ok) in the 'fluidLevel' field, and whether the lid and/or upper container are missing or have been disturbed (in the 'lidStatus' and 'cupStatus' fields). If the upper container is missing and the bottom container does not obviously contain beetles or fluid, skip to 'Resetting the Pitfall Trap'. Otherwise, even if the trap appears empty, continue to the next steps to collect a sample.
- 3. On three locality labels, write: 1) the day (on which the trap collection is occurring) in the space preceding the month and year on the fourth line of the label; 2) the trap ID (i.e., N, S, E or W) and collect date (in the format YYYYMMDD) on the last line of the label (see Figure 7). Use an archival ethanol-safe pen, and record the date (in the collectDate field) and sampleID (plotID.trapID.collectDate) on the field datasheet or in the PDA.

4. Place three copies of locality labels into the container, even if it appears to contain no specimens (**Figure 8**). The labels can be treated in the same way as the trap contents (e.g., rinsed along with specimens in the trap) in the subsequent steps without harm.

- 5. [Optional step] Put on disposable gloves to protect your hands from the materials used. Gloves can be reused.
- 6. Pick up the upper container containing the sample, leaving the lower container in the ground.
- 7. Remove any large debris (e.g., sticks, leaves) from the trap prior to filtering. Take care that no beetles (especially tiny ones) or bycatch are removed.
- 8. In the unlikely event that you find live vertebrate bycatch in the trap, attempt to remove and release the animal. Dead vertebrate bycatch should be collected with the rest of the trap contents.
- 9. Filter the trap contents using a filter cloth and a filter cup (Figure 9).

10. Hold the filter above the waste container and pour the PG solution through the filter so that the sample is collected on the filter and the fluid does not spill onto the ground (**Figure 10-Figure 12**).

11. After sample collection is finished, dispose of used PG solution back at the lab.



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12. Rinse the sample (in the filter cup) using deionized water (**Figure 13**). Rinse above the waste container so rinse water/PG is efficiently collected instead of spilling onto the ground.

13. Rinse sample in filter cup with 95% ethanol over a separate ethanol waste container, or directly over the Whirl-Pak bag in which the sample will be stored until processing in the lab (**Figure 14**).

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14. Place insects in a Whirl-Pak bag (Figure 15), rinse the filter contents into the same Whirl-Pak bag (Figure 16), and add additional ethanol until the contents of the bag are covered with approximately 100 mL of 95% ethanol. Finally, remove the filter from the filter cup and place the filter in the Whirl-Pak (Figure 17), verifying that the filter cup is free from all sample materials before using it to process another sample. Use forceps to gently push the filter into the Whirl-Pak without tearing the Whirl-Pak.

15. Roll the Whirl-Pak bag shut and tightly close the bag's twist ties to prevent leaks (Figure 18).

16. Verify that the appropriate locality labels are in the Whirl-Pak bag.



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- 17. As needed: record remaining metadata, including any irregularities in the remarks (e.g. trap was damaged by bears, wind blew cover off, trap flooded with rainwater).
- 18. Store the Whirl-Pak samples in the shade (e.g., in a backpack) until you return to the field vehicle (see **C.4** for additional instructions).

C.2 Resetting the Pitfall

- 1. Using new solution prepared in the lab, refill the PG mixture in the container to 150 mL line. If the PG solution was under the 150 mL line when the trap was collected (more likely when conditions are hot and dry), add PG up to the 250mL line to prevent potential trap drying.
- 2. Position cover with four plastic nails so that it is visually level and 1.5 cm above the surface of the containers.
- 3. Record that the trap was reset, in the PDA or on the field datasheet.

C.3 When collecting the final sample of the field season:

- 1. Return all trap components to the lab.
- 2. Backfill holes with local substrate. These same holes will be excavated in following years for pitfall trapping.
- 3. Indicate that the final trap processed was not reset, in the PDA or on the field datasheet.

C.4 Sample preservation

- 1. Place all 4 Whirl-Pak bags from a single plot into a resealable plastic bag and label the outside of the bag with date and plot ID (includes siteID) before leaving the plot. You may choose to pre-label these bags in the lab.
- 2. Place bags into Tupperware container, ensuring that the Whirl-Pak bag openings are upward.
- 3. Store samples in a cooler (with ice packs lining the bottom) in the field vehicle to prevent exposure to direct sunlight or extremely high temperatures during the remainder of the field work. When transporting coolers back to the lab avoid exposure to heat (e.g., direct sun) and wind to the extent possible.
- 4. Change ethanol within 1 day of collection (see **SOP D**).



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SOP D Laboratory Processing – Ethanol Rinse and Sorting of Vertebrate Bycatch

D.1 Sample processing timing


The ethanol in which each sample is stored must be changed within 1 day of collection (ideally <24 hours). All vertebrate bycatch must be removed and sorted, and threatened or endangered species reported. Invertebrate bycatch is also removed during this rinse (if time allows). For each trap, record the date of the ethanol change on the sorting datasheet (RD[05]).

Following the rinse, specimens can be stored in ethanol for several months. Final processing, including identification and pinning, as well as submission of samples to taxonomists and/or DNA barcoding facilities (see RD[06]) must occur within four months of the end of the field season. The specimen identifications must be verified and domain voucher collection updated (see RD[06]) before the beginning of the next field season. See **APPENDIX F** for taxonomic identification resources. Quick reference guides and checklists for processing beetle specimens in the lab can be found in **APPENDIX B** - **APPENDIX C**.

D.2 Ethanol rinse and removal of vertebrate bycatch

When performing the ethanol (etOH) rinse (a.k.a. 'etOH change'), the date must be recorded on an ethanol safe label (and using an archival ethanol-safe pen) that is placed inside the Whirl-Pak bag at the time of the rinse. In addition, all vertebrate bycatch must be removed from the pitfall sample at this time, so that large, soft-bodied animals do not degrade the quality of the etOH in the pitfall sample.

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


Figure 19. Workflow of the ethanol rinse and vertebrate bycatch removal processing step. Activities are represented by blue boxes, decisions by grey triangles, and labels by yellow boxes

Figure 19 illustrates the steps for etOH rinse and removal of vertebrate bycatch, with detailed instructions in the following text.

1. [Recommended but optional step] Put on nitrile gloves.



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2. For each trap, pour the sample (including the specimens and the initial ethanol added to the Whirl-Pak in the field) through a filter cloth and into an ethanol waste container (Figure 20). Remove the used filter cloth from the Whirl-Pak and rinse, with 95% ethanol, over the new filter cloth until there is nothing visible on the filter cloth (Figure 21). Place the filter cloth back into the original Whirl-Pak, keeping the original filter with the sample in case small beetles and bycatch are stuck to it.

1. Remove all vertebrate bycatch and record associated data on the sorting datasheet (RD [05]) (local and/or state permits should be consulted for reporting requirements of vertebrate bycatch). Do not enter sorting data into the webUI until all fields have been



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filled out on the sorting datasheet (RD[05]), which may not occur until beetles have been fully sorted and pinned/pointed, and identifications confirmed. In this way, records that need to be updated with new identifications and/or final sample IDs can be updated prior to transcription to the webUI.

- 3. Process vertebrate bycatch in one of two ways, depending on whether the identity of the species is known::
 - a. For each individual taxon in a given plot :
 - i. If the species identity is known:
 - A. Pool all individuals (from the same plot) of the taxon into as few 50mL tubes as are required
 - B. Fill each tube with enough 95% ethanol that there is at least 1/2 inch of ethanol above the fully submerged specimen(s). If there are too many specimens to allow for 1/2 inch of ethanol above the level of the specimens, split the specimens into multiple tubes to ensure that there is 1/2 inch or more of ethanol above the specimens in each tube.
 - C. Include a locality and determination label in each tube, and insert a label into each tube on which the following sample ID is recorded (on an ethanol safe label and using an archival ethanol-safe pen): plotID. collectDate.taxonID.tubeNumber (where tubeNumber is two digits, starts with 01, and increases for as many tubes as contain the same taxon).

Example: Two tubes are required to hold a vertebrate bycatch species for the plot. SampleIDs for these tubes are plotID.collectDate.taxonID.01 and plotID.collectDate.taxonID.02.

Note – sampleIDs are automatically generated by the webUI when the Sample Type is 'vertebrate bycatch', there is an entry in the 'Taxon ID' field, and the box for 'This is a pooled sample' is checked.



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- D. Only one record is required per tube of pooled specimens. For each tube:
 - I. Record "N" in the trapID field
 - II. Insert the "N" between the plotID and collect date in the sampleID and record this in the "intermediate (associated) sampleID" field (format: plotID.N.collectDate.taxonID.tubeNumber) (see APPENDIX H).
 - III. Record the sample ID generated in step a.i.C in the 'final sample ID (sampleID)' field (see APPENDIX H).
 - IV. The identity of the individuals in the tube, to the finest taxonomic level possible (preferably species), in the 'Sci. Name OR taxonID'.
 - V. Record the number of individuals in the tube, in the 'Individual Count' field
 - VI. If it can be determined whether Carabid beetles are present in the rest of the pitfall sample, record 'Y' or 'N' in the 'Carabids (targetTaxa) Present' field; otherwise leave this field blank
 - VII. Record the etOH rinse date in the 'etOH change date' field
 - VIII. All other data that can be filled out (e.g., sample type, date of identification, etc.)on the sorting datasheet
- ii. If the species identity is unknown:
 - A. Place all individuals of a given taxon, and taken from a single *trap*, into as few 50mL tubes as are required
 - B. Fill each tube with enough 95% ethanol that there is at least 1/2 inch of ethanol above the fully submerged specimen(s). If there are too many specimens to allow for 1/2 inch of ethanol above the level of the specimens, split the specimens into multiple tubes to ensure that there is 1/2 inch or more of ethanol above the specimens in each tube.



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C. Include a locality label in each tube, and insert a label into each tube on which the following sample ID is recorded (on an ethanol safe label and using an archival ethanol-safe pen): plotID.trapID.collectDate.vb.tubeNumber (where vb stands for 'vertebrate bycatch' and the tubeNumber is two digits, starts at 01, and increases for as many tubes as contain unknown vertebrate bycatch) in the trap.

Example: One tube is required to hold a particular species of unknown vertebrate bycatch for trap S, and two tubes are required to hold a different unknown vertebrate bycatch species for trap S. SampleIDs for these tubes are: plotID.S.collectDate.vb.01; plotID.S.collectDate.vb.02; plotID.S.collectDate.vb.03.Note — sampleIDs are automatically generated by the web user interface (webUI) when the sample Type is 'vertebrate bycatch' and the Taxon ID field contains *no*value

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- D. For each tube, record on the sorting datasheet:
 - The sample ID in **BOTH** the 'Intermediate (associated)
 Sample ID' and 'final sample ID (sampleID)' fields (see APPENDIX H).
 - II. The morphospecies ID in the 'morphospecies ID' field (see section F.2 for instructions on morphospecies naming conventions).
 - III. The number of individuals in the tube, in the 'Individual Count' field
 - IV. If it can be determined whether Carabid beetles are present in the rest of the pitfall sample, record 'Y' or 'N' in the 'Carabids (targetTaxa) Present' field; otherwise leave this field blank.
 - V. The etOH rinse date in the 'etOH change date' field
 - VI. All other data that can be filled out (e.g., sample type, date of identification, etc.) on the sorting datasheet



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- b. Store processed samples at room temperature in the flammables cabinets unless there is ample space in refrigerators (4°C) or freezers (-20°C)
- 4. Transfer invertebrates and locality labels back into the same Whirl-Pak bag from the field.
- 5. Pour fresh 95% ethanol into each Whirl-Pak bag, ensuring that all of the insects are submerged, and close the bag, leaving as little airspace as possible.
- 6. Confirm that the appropriate labels (including that with the etOH rinse date) are still in the Whirl-Pak bag.
- 7. Keep the Whirl-Pak bags from all traps within a plot together in a small bag and put each sampling bout (all the plots from a single date) into a labeled airtight plastic container or resealable bag (**Figure 22**) and seal tightly until further processing (sorting, pinning, etc., detailed in the following steps).

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SOP E Laboratory Processing – Sorting Invertebrate Bycatch

E.1 Preparation for Sorting

1. Clear lab bench space for beetle sorting and processing. Coordinate with potentially conflicting activities (e.g. soil sieving). Work beside fume hood/extractors to diminish inhalation of ethanol fumes.

2. Secure access to:


- a. Propylene glycol and ethanol waste storage.
- b. Sink for washing materials.
- c. At least one dissecting microscope
- d. Storage space for samples (e.g., cold storage for tubes of individuals)
- e. Storage space for pinned insects in Cornell drawers or Schmitt boxes.

E.2 Sorting Invertebrate Bycatch

NEON is interested in adult beetles of the family Carabidae. All other invertebrates, including non-carabid beetles and larval beetles of any kind, should be stored in separate, invertebrate bycatch containers. Do not begin sorting ground beetles from other invertebrates in the pitfall sample unless certain that the process can be completed for all samples in a plot. It is important that each sample remains clearly labeled and is not left unattended for any length of time. Never separate samples from their labels. Sorting is best done under the microscope.

It is not uncommon for parts of beetles to become dissociated during the time that they are in pitfall traps in the field. If this happens, dissociated beetle parts should be treated as invertebrate bycatch *unless* all three pieces of the main body (head, pronotum, AND abdomen) are present, these pieces can *confidently* be identified as belonging to a single specimen, AND the beetle can be identified as a member of the family Carabidae.

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


Figure 23. Workflow for processing invertebrate bycatch. Activities are represented by blue boxes, intermediate and final products by red boxes, decisions by grey triangles, and labels by yellow boxes.

Steps for sorting invertebrate bycatch are detailed in Figure 23, with instructions in the following text.

- 1. Sort each sample individually, from one trap at a time.
- 2. Suspend specimens in ethanol in the Whirl-Pak bag so that they are uniformly floating throughout. Jostle the bag and use wash bottle to add 95% ethanol if necessary.
- 3. Pour specimens into a large Petri dish marked with a grid (hereafter referred to as the sorting dish). Remove or add 95% ethanol as needed to keep specimens submerged in the sorting dish, using a transfer pipette and a secondary container for used ethanol (removal) or wash bottle of ethanol (addition).
- 4. Remove the filter cloth from the Whirl-Pak and inspect it for any small invertebrates that may be attached. Rinse invertebrates into the sorting dish, with 95% ethanol, and then discard the filter.



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- 5. Remove all non-beetle invertebrates, larval beetles, and beetle body parts that cannot be confidently identified as belonging to an individual carabid, and place these into a temporary container marked 'invert bycatch'. Make sure this container always contains enough 95% ethanol to fully submerge its contents, and place a locality label (taken from the locality labels in the original pitfall trap) into the temporary holding container.
- 6. Using a dissecting microscope, sort all remaining beetle specimens into either the temporary 'invert bycatch' container OR a second temporary container that is marked 'carabids' and into which a single locality label, from those in the initial pitfall trap, has been placed (see **APPENDIX G** for guides for delineating which beetles are carabids). If a specimen cannot be confidently identified to the family Carabidae, but is a member of the suborder Adephaga, treat as if it is a carabid.
- 7. If, at the end of sorting, no carabids have been found in the sample, mark 'N' on the sorting datasheet for 'Carabids (targetTaxa) Present'.
- 8. Record the presence of invertebrate bycatch at the trap-level (circle 'invert bycatch' in the sampleType field), and fill in the 'processingDate', 'recordedBy', and 'etOH Change Date' fields. Neither counts nor taxonomic identifications are expected for invertebrate bycatch specimens.
- 9. When all samples from a plot have been fully sorted, pool invertebrate bycatch by the plotID and collectDate.
 - a. Transfer all invertebrate bycatch specimens from the four traps within a plot into as few 50 mL tube as are required, leaving ½ inch empty at top of tube.
 - i. Be sure to move the locality labels into the new storage tubes (e.g., if the invertebrate bycatch from traps N and S fit into one 50mL storage tube, place the locality labels for both traps into the new storage tube).
 - ii. If multiple tubes are required from the same trap, generate additional locality labels and place a locality label in each tube.
 - b. Insert a new sampleID into each tube: plotID.collectDate.ib.tubeNumber (where tubeNumber is two digits and starts at 01.).



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Example: Two tubes are required to hold invertebrate bycatch for a plot, one with specimens from traps N and S, and the other with specimens from traps E and W. SampleIDs for these tubes are plotID.collectDate.ib.01 and plotID.collectDate.ib.02.

Note – sampleIDs are automatically generated by the webUI when the Sample Type is 'invertebrate bycatch'.

- c. If the number pooled tubes = 1 **AND** carabids are present in all traps **or** absent from all traps:
 - i. Only one record is required for all traps
 - ii. Record "N" in the trapID field
 - iii. Record the sample ID in **BOTH** the "intermediate (**associated**) sampleID" and "final sampleID (**sampleID**)" fields (see APPENDIX H).
 - iv. Circle Y/N in the "targetTaxaPresent" field to indicate the presence or absence of carabids in the pooled samples.
- d. If the number pooled tubes >1 **OR** carabids are present in some but not all traps:
 - i. A sorting record is required for each trap
 - ii. Record the sample ID for the tube into which a traps contents were transferred in BOTH the "intermediate (associated) sampleID" and "final sampleID (sampleID)" fields (see APPENDIX H).
 - iii. Circle Y/N in "targetTaxaPresent" field of each record, to indicate the presence or absence of carabids in each trap

Example: If the invertebrate bycatch from traps N and S are stored in one tube, enter the sample ID generated in step (9.b) in the 'intermediate (associated) sampleID' and 'final sampleID (sampleID)' fields for the records for both the N and S traps.

This will result in multiple records with the same value in the 'Intermediate (associated) Sample ID' and 'final sample ID (sampleID)' fields, but different values in the trapID and (potentially) targetTaxaPresent fields. This is OK.



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- e. Fill each tube with 95% ethanol, with at least ½ inch of ethanol above the fully submerged specimen(s). Split the specimens into multiple tubes if necessary to ensure that there is ½ inch or more of ethanol above the specimens in each tube (Figure 24).
- f. Some samples may contain debris that will be stored with the bycatch (large items, e.g., leaves or twigs, may be removed and discarded, but be careful that small invertebrates are not attached to them).





Figure 24. Bycatch samples stored in a 50 mL centrifuge tubes, the amount of ethanol in a bycatch sample will vary by sample size.

- 10. In the rare instance that invertebrate bycatch has *not* been pooled by plotID and collectDate:
 - a. Fill out all trap-level metadata (e.g., processingDate, etOH Change Date, etc.) as above.
 - b. Insert a new sampleID label into each tube: plotID.trapID.collectDate.ib.tubeNumber (where tubeNumber is two digits and starts with 01, then increases for as many tubes as contain the invertebrate bycatch for the trap).



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Example: Two tubes are required to hold invertebrate bycatch for a trap N. SampleIDs for these tubes are plotID.N.collectDate.ib.01 and plotID.N.collectDate.ib.02.Note – sampleIDs are automatically generated by the webUI when the Sample Type is 'invertebrate bycatch' and the box for 'Not a pooled sample' is checked.

- c. Fill each tube with 95% ethanol, with at least ½ inch of ethanol above the fully submerged specimen(s). Split the specimens into multiple tubes if necessary to ensure that there is ½ inch or more of ethanol above the specimens in each tube
- d. Some samples may contain debris that will be stored with the bycatch (large items, e.g., leaves or twigs, may be removed and discarded, but be careful that small invertebrates are not attached to them).
- e. Record the sample ID in **BOTH** the 'Intermediate (**associated**) Sample ID' and 'final sample ID (**sampleID**)' fields of each record, and circle "Y" or "N" in the targetTaxaPresent field (see APPENDIX H).
- 11. Store processed samples at room temperature in the flammable storage cabinets.



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SOP F Laboratory Processing - Sorting Ground beetles

Carabid beetles will be sorted, and then pinned or pointed (instructions in **SOP G**), or stored in 95% ethanol. The final destination of these specimens will include: 1) a domain's teaching collection, 2) a DNA barcode facility (just a tissue sample), 3) an archive facility. This protocol provides instructions for beetle processing through the pinning or pointing stage. Instructions for additional processing steps (e.g., sending specimens to various facilities, creating teaching collections, etc.) are found in RD[06].




Figure 25. Workflow for processing carabid beetles. Activities are represented by blue boxes, intermediate and final products by red boxes, decisions by grey triangles, and labels by yellow boxes.

Carabid beetles should be sorted in concurrence with the sorting of invertebrate bycatch, as described in **SOP E**. Sorting should occur on a trap-by-trap basis so that specimens from individual traps are kept separate through the entire sorting process. The general process of sorting carabid beetles is illustrated in **Figure 25**, with detailed instructions in the following text.

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1. For each individual taxon in a given plot:

- a. For species for which the identity is known (including but not limited to those listed as common and reliably identified (APPENDIX E) OR the identity is unknown (morphospecies see section D.8 for morphospecies identification guidelines) but > 20 individuals are present:
 - i. Place all individuals of a given taxon, and from the same trap, into as few 50 mL tubes as required.
 - ii. Fill each tube with enough 95% ethanol that there is at least 1/2 inch of ethanol above the fully submerged specimen(s). If there are too many specimens to allow for 1/2 inch of ethanol above the level of the specimens, split the specimens into multiple tubes to ensure that there is 1/2 inch or more of ethanol above the specimens in each tube.
 - iii. Include a locality and determination label in each tube.
 - iv. For species whose identities are known:
 - A. Insert a label into each tube on which the following sample ID is recorded (recorded on ethanol safe paper and using an archival ethanol-safe pen): plotID.trapID.collectDate.taxonID.tubeNumber (where tubeNumber is two digits, starts with 01, and increases for as many tubes as contain the same taxon).

Example: Two tubes are required to hold a particular carabid species for trap W. SampleIDs for these tubes are plotID.W.collectDate.taxonID.01 and plotID.W.collectDate.taxonID.02.Note – sampleIDs are automatically generated by the webUI when the Sample Type is 'common carabid', there is an entry in the 'Taxon ID' field.

- v. For species whose identities are unknown and are abundant (>20 individuals) :
 - A. Note- Morphospecies that are abundant (>20 individuals) are treated as common species (sampleType = 'common carabid') even though they may not be listed as common or reliably identified. This allows for proper sample tracking and reduces the number of individuals that must be pinned



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B. Insert a label into each tube on which the following sample ID is recorded (recorded on ethanol safe paper and using an archival ethanol-safe pen): plotID.trapID.collectDate.cc.tubeNumber (where 'cc' stands for 'common carabid' and the tube number is two digits, starts at 01, and increases for as many tubes as contain morphospecies in the trap).

Example: Two tubes are required to hold MorphA and two tubes are required to hold MorphB in trap E. SampleIDs for these tubes are plotID.E.collectDate.cc.01, plotID.E.collectDate.cc.02, plotID.E.collectDate.cc.03, and plotID.E.collectDate.cc.04.Note — This sampleID is automatically generated by the webUI when the Sample Type is 'common carabid' and the Taxon ID field contains *no* value.

- vi. For each tube, record on the sorting datasheet:
 - A. The sample ID generated in step iv.A or v.B in the 'Intermediate (associated) Sample ID' field (see APPENDIX H).
 - B. The number of individuals in the tube, in the 'Individual Count' field
 - C. 'Y' in the 'Carabids (targetTaxa) Present' field
 - D. 'common carabid' in the sampleType field
 - E. The etOH rinse date in the 'etOH change date' field
 - F. The identity of the individuals in the tube, to the finest taxonomic level possible (preferably species), in the 'Sci. Name OR taxonID' or 'morphospecies ID' field (see section D.8 for instructions on morphospecies naming conventions).
 - G. All other data that can be filled out (e.g., date of identification, etc.)
- b. If the species is unknown and there are \leq 20 individuals present:
 - i. Place all individuals from a single *trap* into as few 50mL tubes as are required.
 - ii. Fill each tube with enough 95% ethanol that there is at least 1/2 inch of ethanol above the fully submerged specimen(s). If there are too many specimens to allow for 1/2 inch of ethanol above the level of the specimens,



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split the specimens into multiple tubes to ensure that there is 1/2 inch or more of ethanol above the specimens in each tube.

- iii. Include a locality label in each tube.
- iv. Insert a label into each tube on which the following sample ID is recorded (on an ethanol safe label and using an archival ethanol-safe pen): plotID.trapID. collectDate.oc.tubeNumber (where 'oc' stands for 'other carabid' and the tube number is two digits, starts at 0.1 and increases for as many tubes as contain the unidentified carabids)

Example: Two tubes are required to hold all unknown carabids in trap N. SampleIDs for these tubes are plotID.N.collectDate.oc.01 and plotID.N.collectDate.oc.02.Note – sampleIDs are automatically generated by the webUI when the Sample Type is 'other carabid'.

- v. For each tube, record on the sorting datasheet:
 - I. The sample ID generated in step b.iv in the 'Intermediate (associated) Sample ID' field (see APPENDIX H).
 - II. 'Y' in the 'Carabids (targetTaxa) Present' field
 - III. 'other carabid' in the sampleType field
 - IV. The etOH rinse date in the 'etOH change date' field
 - V. The morphospecies ID (see section D.8 for instructions on morphospecies naming conventions) in the 'morphospecies ID' field
 - VI. All other data that can be filled out (e.g., processingDate, etc.)
- c. Close the lid on the tube(s) tightly so no ethanol leaks out (can result in smeared labels).
- 2. When all samples from a plot have been fully sorted, pool individuals of the same species by the plotID and collectDate:
 - a. Transfer all individuals of the same species (from all four traps in the plot) into as few 50 mL tubes as are required. Be sure to move the locality labels into the new storage tubes



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- i. Example: If the individuals from traps N and S fit into one 50mL storage tube, place the locality labels for traps N and S into the new storage tube.
- b. Insert a new sampleID label (recorded on ethanol safe paper and using an archival ethanol-safe pen) into the tube with: plotID.collectDate.taxonID.tubeNumber (where tubeNumber is two digits and starts with 01, then increases for as many tubes as contain the individuals of that taxon for the plot).
- c. For each record, write the sample ID from step (2.b) in 'final sample ID (**sampleID**)' field of the sorting datasheet (see APPENDIX H).

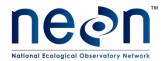
Example: If the specimens from traps N and S are stored in one tube, enter the sample ID generated in step (2.b) in the 'final sample ID (sampleID)' fields for the records for both the N and S traps.Note – This will result in multiple records with the same value in 'final sample ID (sampleID)' fields, but different values in the trapID field. This is OK.

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- d. Fill each tube with enough 95% ethanol that there is at least 1/2 inch of ethanol above the fully submerged specimen(s). If there are too many specimens to allow for 1/2 inch of ethanol above the level of the specimens, split the specimens into multiple tubes to ensure that there is 1/2 inch or more of ethanol above the specimens in each tube.
- 3. Some samples may contain debris that will be stored with the bycatch (large items, e.g., leaves or twigs, may be removed and discarded, but be careful that small invertebrates are not attached to them).
- 4. Store processed samples at room temperature in the flammables cabinets unless there is ample space in refrigerators (4°C) or freezers (-20°C)

F.1 Equipment maintenance, cleaning, and storage

- 1. After all samples have been sorted:
 - a. Empty, wash, and dry all waste receptacles (e.g. ethanol and PG containers).
 - b. Return all flammables to the appropriate cabinets.
 - c. Pack equipment and consumables for subsequent field work and store neatly.



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F.2 Identify ground beetles to species or morphospecies

Identification of ground beetles generally occurs after all of the ground beetles collected at a site during the season have been pinned or pointed (except those most common and reliably identified beetles on the site-specific lists and large groups (>20) of individuals of the same, unknown, species encountered during sorting). Various tools are available for aiding species identifications (e.g., see **APPENDIX F**).

A morphospecies is a temporary designation for an individual or group of beetles that are all of the same group (ideally that group is a species, but all that is designated by a morphospecies is that all these individuals look to be the same).

- If a species designation cannot be made based on the teaching collection or other identification resources, assign a morphospecies name to that type of ground beetle.
- As a general rule, split groups that look similar but not identical into different morphospecies, focusing on features like: size, color, proportions and the shape of the pronotum. It is easy to lump them together later, but difficult to later split them into multiple species.
- Ground beetle morphospecies should be prioritized for identification by taxonomic experts, who
 will return identified specimens that should then be added to the teaching collection at the
 domain lab.
- Morphospecies IDs include: domainID, the year of capture, and the word "Morph" followed by one or more unique letters. For example, "D15.2014.MorphA" would be the first morphospecies from domain 15 that was captured in 2014.
- The letter at the end of the morphospecies ID (e.g., "A") should never be repeated for any other morphospecies than that for which it was originally designated, in a given year. If more than 26 morphospecies are encountered in a given domain in a given year, the 27th morphospecies ID should include two letters at the end (e.g., the 27th morphospecies in domain 15, for 2014, would be "D15.2014.MorphAA")
- If it is unclear whether a newly captured specimen is the same as individuals of a previously assigned morphospecies ID, a new morphospecies ID should be assigned (it is better to have the same species designated as different morphospecies than to have multiple different species designated as the same morphospecies).

Record and describe each morphospecies on the morphospecies datasheet, along with the year and name of the person who designated it. If a taxonomist is able to identify some individuals of a morphospecies to species, the identity of all the other individuals of that morphospecies should be updated on both the sorting and ID and pinning datasheets (or in the respective web user interfaces (webUIs)).



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SOP G Laboratory Processing – Pinning and Pointing Ground Beetles and Sample Preservation

G.1 Pinning and pointing large and small ground beetles

Pinning and pointing involve mounting specimens directly onto a pin (if they are large enough) or onto a small paper triangle on a pin (if they are very small), respectively. The individuals selected for pinning and pointing should represent different plots and sampling bouts throughout the entire sampling period (e.g., individuals should be selected from all plots, and from samples representing all bouts in which they were captured). Additionally, these individuals should exhibit the range of morphological variation encountered for the species in question (e.g., species with varying degrees of red patterning on their elytra should have representatives of the range of variation for this patterning). Pinning or pointing is required for:

- 1. Up to 100 specimens for ground beetles not listed on the Common Reliably Identified Ground Beetle Species List (APPENDIX E), including morphospecies. When 100 specimens have been pinned or pointed, the remaining specimens should be pooled into 50 mL tubes and a new record generated on the sorting datasheet in accordance with SOP F (e.g., process the remaining specimens as you would if you were processing them during sorting)
- 2. Up to 20 individuals per species per site per year of common and easily identified ground beetles.

Note – In order to ensure that temporal, spatial, and morphological variation is accounted for in the selection of beetles to be pinned and pointed, individuals of common and reliably identified species will be selected after all sorting has been completed for the year for all bouts in all plots at the site.

Data for each pinned or pointed specimen should be recorded on the ID and Pinning datasheet (RD[05]) or in a Pin Activity of the web user interface (webUI). Most of the data for the datasheet can be found on labels in the tubes from which the specimens are obtained, or in the record in the sorting datasheet that corresponds to this tube. This includes data for the 'intermediate (associated) sample ID' field, which is the sample ID from the label inside of the tube from which the specimen is obtained.

Note – The counts per tube for records on the sorting datasheet need to be updated when individuals from tubes containing a taxonID or 'cc' in the 'final sampleID (sampleID)' are pinned. This is not required if the 'final sampleID (sampleID)' contains 'oc', because no counts were initially provided on the sorting datasheet.



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Example: Two individuals were removed from a tube with the following information recorded on the sorting datasheet:

Intermediate (associated) sample ID: CPER_001.N.20140506.cc.01 Final sample ID (sampleID): CPER_001.20140506.cc.01 Individual count: 8

After these individuals have been pinned or pointed, the sorting datasheet record for the tube must be updated with an **individual count** of 6.

Note- If there are multiple sorting datasheet records with a final sample ID of CPER_001.20140506.cc.01, update the individual count in **only one** of these records, it does not matter which.

G.2 Determine whether to pin or point the specimen

- 1. Generally specimens 5 mm and greater are pinned, and specimens smaller than 5 mm are pointed (**Table 8**; **Figure 26**).
- 2. Pointing is a good default option for any specimen you are concerned will be destroyed by pinning (**Table 8**; **Figure 26**).

| Specimen size and criteria | Mounting Method |
|--|-----------------|
| ≥ 5mm | Pinning |
| ≥ 5 mm but likely to be damaged by pinning | Pointing |
| < 5 mm | Pointing |

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G.3 Prepare points (if pointing)

- 3. Prepare a batch of points prior to beginning pointing specimens.
- 4. Using 100% rag cotton paper (Bristol or equivalent), prepare ~40 triangles using the point punch.
- 5. Over a balsa wood surface, for each point, press a No. 3 archival quality pin into the point at the center of the point's base (see the "X" in **Figure 27**). Ensure that the point is at a 90 degree angle from the pin and neither angled up nor down.



Figure 27. Materials for pointing including a schematic of a point showing where to place pin



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4. Use a pinning block (**Figure 28**) to push the point up the pin until it is 15 mm from the top (non-pointed end) of the pin. This leaves enough space above the insect for the pin to be handled, and below for labels. Additionally, specimens at a uniform height are easier to examine and compare with one another.



Figure 28. A pinning block with a point and the various labels that will be affixed to a pinned or pointed specimen. This shows the heights at which points and various labels should be placed on a pin.

G.4 Prepare labels

- See APPENDIX I for instructions on creating locality labels. These are created for all
 mounted beetle specimens during field preparation and will be placed on the pin below
 each specimen.
- 2. See **APPENDIX J** for instructions on creating determination labels. These are created for all mounted beetle specimens during field preparation and will be placed on the pin below the locality label located below each specimen. Ground beetles that have not yet been identified, however, may be mounted on pins with locality labels but no determination labels.
- 3. See **APPENDIX** K for instructions on creating insect individual ID labels. These will be created for all mounted beetle and specimens at the time of preparation and will be placed on the pin below the determination label (which is below the locality label) located below each specimen.



It is important to consider how you will attach the correct locality and determination labels to specimens as you are mounting them. *A specimen dissociated from its labels is worthless*.



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G.5 Mount Specimens

- 1. For pointed beetle specimens:
 - a. Pointing should be done under the dissecting microscope so that the point is attached to the correct place on the beetle. For efficiency, work with several specimens (from the same pitfall trap or sampling bout) at a time.
 - b. After removing a specimen from the tube, allow it to dry for a few minutes. It is easier to work with dried specimens when pointing.
 - Use forceps to put the beetle specimen on its left side on a slip of plain white paper, so that its head is facing the right and its legs are toward the edge of the bench (Figure 29)



Figure 29. A ground beetle on its side in preparation for pointing

- d. Slide the slip of paper with the beetle to the center of the microscope stage.




Figure 30. Examples of bending a point tip to maintain a level body position of the specimen

- e. Examine the slope of the ground beetle's thorax to determine if the tip of the point needs to be bent to ensure that the specimen will lie flat on the point. Use forceps to bend the point if needed (**Figure 30**).
 - i. NOTE: The sides of a beetle's thorax can slope inward to differing degrees, therefore, the tip of the point can be bent down with forceps to accommodate the size and shape of each specimen. For example, a specimen that has a flat-bottomed thorax can be mounted on a flat (unbent) point. A specimen on which the sides of the thorax are vertical must have the tip of the point bent downward at a right angle. See Figure

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


Figure 31. A well-pointed beetle specimen, with associated labels




Figure 32. A poorly pointed beetle specimen

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30 for thorax slope scenarios and **Figure 31** - **Figure 32** for examples of well-pointed and poorly-pointed specimens, respectively.

f. Take the prepared point and touch the tip of the point in a bit of glue that has been squeezed out onto a paper towel or piece of paper (**Figure 33**). Use the minimum amount of glue needed in order to attach the specimen firmly to the point.



Figure 33. Preparing to glue a specimen to a point by dipping the tip of the point in glue.




Figure 34. Diagram of ventral side of a beetle, with and X indicating where to place point

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- g. Under a microscope, zoom in on the target location for the tip of the point, this being on the **RIGHT** side (from a dorsal perspective) of the specimen's thorax and between the bases of the 2nd and 3rd pairs of legs (see "X" on **Figure 34**). Gently press the glue-covered tip of the point to the beetle's body (**Figure 35**), and wipe off excess glue in order to avoid obscuring any part of the beetle with large amounts of glue.
 - i. Note: Although the point and glue will obscure one side of the thorax, the other side needs to remain unobscured for examination. Neither the point nor the glue should extend onto the top or the bottom of the beetle, nor touch the head, abdomen, or wings.
 - ii. **Note:** Be sure to place the point on the *right* side of the specimen

- h. Wait for the glue to set slightly, so that the beetle stays relatively still when the pin is moved. Then lift and angle the pin so that the weight of the specimen is leaning directly into the point and the specimen is properly aligned on the point, as in **Figure 30 Figure 31**.
- i. Place the pin in a block of Styrofoam such that gravity is holding the specimen down on the point at the correct angle.
- j. Adjust the specimen as needed with forceps or a pin to ensure the specimen binds firmly to the point. A heavy specimen that rotates on the point should be straightened as the glue thickens but before it completely hardens.
- k. Slide the locality label (instructions in APPENDIX I) onto the pin below the specimen, and use the second-deepest hole in the pinning block to position the label at the correct height (Figure 36). Position the specimen perpendicular to the text on the label, with the back edge of the point slightly inset from the short edge of the label and the specimen centered between the two longer edges of the label (Figure 35).
 - i. **Note**: Now is a great time to ensure that the label information is correct.

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- Attach the determination label (instructions in APPENDIX J) below the locality label.
 Use the third-deepest hole in the pinning block to position the label at the correct height. Orient the label in the same manner as the locality label.
- m. Attach the insect individual ID label (instructions in **APPENDIX K**) below the determination label using the fourth-deepest (most shallow) hole. Orient the label in the same manner as the locality label.
- n. When all of the specimens are mounted and labeled, examine them under the microscope to confirm that they are all attached securely to the points. To test this, place the specimens in a Schmitt box or unit tray and tap the box or tray. The specimens should remain affixed. Re-attach any specimen that do not stay affixed to the points, as long as it is clear which locality label belongs with the specimen.

2. For pinned beetle specimens:

- a. Note: if you are new to pinning, start with larger specimens as they are easier. Keep specimens in ethanol until ready to pin.
- b. Use only No. 3 archival quality pins. Finer pins are too flexible and vibrate in the specimen, destroying them from within. Thicker pins damage specimens as they are inserted.
- c. Press your thumb and index finger together in order to form a "v", which you will use to support the specimen as you insert the pin.
- d. Place the specimen into the "v" and position it so that it is straight in your fingers and the legs are facing downward.

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


Figure 37. Ground beetle pinning and dorsal side schematic showing where to place the pin (marked by an "X")

- e. Insert the pin vertically through the top layer of the specimen's body (Figure 37).
 - i. Note: It is important to insert the pin in the correct location in the beetle's body. A properly placed pin is positioned on the RIGHT side of the beetle (when viewed dorsally), halfway between the midline of the beetle's body and the edge where the elytra (wing shells) begin to round behind the thorax (see the "X" in Figure 37).
 - ii. **Note:** Be sure to place the pin through the *right* side of the specimen

- f. Gently slide the pin through the body of the specimen, using your fingers to support the body as you push the pin through. Push the pin slowly and with constant pressure.
- g. Pause and look at the specimen from the side BEFORE pushing the pin all of the way through.






Figure 38. Correctly and incorrectly pinned beetle specimens

- h. Ensure that the pin is at a right angle to the beetle's body and push the specimen up the pin until its top surface is 15 mm from the top of the pin. This leaves enough space above the specimen for the pin to handled and below for labels. Additionally, specimens at a uniform height are easier to examine and compare with one another. See **Figure 38** for examples of well-pinned and poorly-pinned specimens.

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- i. Slide the locality label (instructions in APPENDIX I) onto the pin below the specimen, and use the second-deepest hole in the pinning block to position the label at the correct height (Figure 39). Position the specimen in the middle of the locality label and with the head pointing to the left side. The specimen should be lined up with the long axis of the body parallel to the print on the label (Figure 39).
 - i. **Note**: Now is a great time to ensure that the label information is correct.

- j. Attach the determination label (instructions in **APPENDIX J**) below the locality label. Use the third-deepest hole in the pinning block to position the label at the correct height. Orient the label in the same manner as the locality label.
- k. Attach the insect individual ID label (instructions in **APPENDIX K**) below the determination label using the fourth-deepest (most shallow) hole. Orient the label in the same manner as the locality label.

G.6 Loss of Body Parts

- If a part of a specimen, such as a leg, falls off during pinning, save it and re-attach it to the beetle (provided you are certain which specimen the body part belongs to; Figure 40). To do this:
 - a. Hold the part being reattached with forceps.
 - b. Touch the top of the body part to a bit of glue.



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
c. Place the body part back into correct location and orientation and hold until the glue has set.

G.7 Sample Preservation

- 1. Pinned or pointed ground beetle specimens are to be stored in airtight Schmitt boxes or in unit trays in Cornell cabinet drawers, with a small amount of moth crystals (\approx 6.5 g) in a cardboard fumigant box.

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


Figure 41. Proper orientation of mounted specimens in unit trays within a Cornell drawer.

- 2. After a specimen has been pinned or pointed, and any glue has dried, it should be placed in a box or tray so that locality labels are oriented in the same direction as those of the other specimens in the box or tray (**Figure 41**).

- 3. Specimens should be grouped into unit trays within each Cornell drawer or Schmitt box by species or morphospecies, leaving space to place specimens mounted at a later date/from different sampling bouts. If there are empty areas in the Cornell drawer, fill them with empty unit trays to keep those holding specimens from sliding around.
- 4. If there are not enough unit trays, containing specimens, to fill a Schmitt box or Cornell drawer, add empty unit trays so that filled trays are unable to slide around.
- 5. A fumigant box should be secured in the corner of one of the unit trays with pins, so that it does not slide around and damage specimens (**Figure 42**).

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- 6. Specimen storage containers and workspaces should be kept clean to prevent pests. Dermestid beetles are common pests in insect collections. If you notice dermestid beetle activity, such as debris under a specimen or larval skins of dermestid beetles, freeze the drawer/box for two weeks and clean up the damage.
- 7. Check/replace moth crystals monthly.
- 8. Samples can be stored in this manner indefinitely.
- 9. Maintain fumigant in every drawer, including those without specimens. The fumigant acts as a repellent, but will not kill pests if they get into the collection.
- 10. Never leave boxes or drawers sitting out, put them away when you are not working on them
- 11. Keep counters clean, always wipe down with ethanol before putting a box or drawer on a countertop.
- 12. Minimize amount of time lids are off drawers; never put drawers or lids on the floors
- 13. Keep all dead insects away from light, e.g. lights and windowsills. If sticky traps are used to capture pests in/around the boxes or drawers, replace these traps frequently.



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SOP H Data Entry and Verification

Field data collected on paper datasheets should be digitally transcribed within 14 days of collection or the end of a sampling bout (where applicable). See RD[04] for complete instructions regarding manual data transcription.

Ensure that all metadata from the paper datasheets are entered into the PDA (for field – collected data only) or web user interface (webUI). Metadata include field or lab notes that detail any deviations from the protocol. Explain what was done and why, so that any questions/problems/inconsistencies can be understood. The sooner these data are entered, the more detail from the lab/field will be remembered and recorded. This improves data quality.

H.1 Field datasheets

- At the end of each field day or as soon as possible after data collection (14 day limit),
 according to instructions in the NEON Protocol: manual data transcription (AD[04]), field
 data should be promptly and carefully transcribed into the webUI (if PDAs are not available).
 Notes that apply to an entire plot should be recorded for each plot (e.g., 'mowing disturbed
 all traps at the plot).
- 2. Scan datasheets and save in PDF file format.
- 3. Save paper copy of datasheets.

H.2 Sorting and ID & Pinning datasheets

- Data from sorting datasheets should be carefully transcribed after all beetle processing (including ID'ing and pinning) is complete and all data are recorded and/or updated (e.g., new records have been generated for beetles that were pooled after enough specimens had been pinned, final sampleIDs have been generated, counts have been updated when beetles were removed from tubes for pinning/pointing) on the datasheet.
- 2. Data from ID and Pinning datasheets should be promptly and carefully transcribed into the webUI.
- 3. Scan datasheets and save in PDF file format.
- 4. Save paper copy of datasheets.

H.3 Morphospecies datasheet

- Promptly and carefully transcribe data into the <u>beetleMorphospeciesTracking datasheet</u>, in NEON sharepoint.
- 2. Scan datasheets and save in PDF file format.



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3. Save paper copy of datasheets.

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APPENDIX B Quick References

Quick Reference: Getting Ready for Field Sampling

STEP 1 – Charge all electronic devices (e.g., GPS units and PDAs)

STEP 2 – Upload waypoints into GPS or get maps of trap locations

STEP 3 – Print locality labels

STEP 4 – Prepare chemicals

STEP 5 – Pack extra materials: pitfall trap parts, chemicals, storage container



Properly installed pitfall trap. Lip of top container is flush with the ground



Improperly installed pitfall trap. Lip of top container is above the ground surface

Properly installed pitfall trap has:

- Lip of top cup flush with ground
- No gap between top and bottom cups
- No gap between bottom cup and ground
- Minimal disturbance of surrounding vegetation

Adjust height of lid as needed, to ensure that:

- Ground beetles can enter
- Precipitation cannot get into traps and dilute PG solution
- Lid provides shade, slowing evaporation and decomposition of captured specimens



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Quick Reference: Collecting Insects from Trap

- **STEP 1** Record date and trapID on three locality labels
- **STEP 2** Place three locality labels in top container
- **STEP 3** Remove top container
- STEP 4 Filter contents over waste container
- **STEP 5** Rinse sample through filter with distilled water
- **STEP 6** Rinse sample through filter with 95% ethanol
- **STEP 7** Transfer **ALL** organisms and locality labels to Whirl-Pak bag, fill with 95% ethanol until all contents are submerged.
- **STEP 8** Rinse filter apparatus with ethanol, over Whirl-Pak bag, to ensure that no organisms are left behind.
- **STEP 9** Place mesh filter into Whirl-Pak bag (with specimens and locality labels)
- **STEP 10** Record all metadata and any irregularities on datasheet or PDA.

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Quick Reference: Processing Trapped Specimens

Ethanol Rinse (within 24 hours of sample collection)

- **STEP 1** Filter contents of Whirl-Pak bag (specimens, labels, and mesh filter), discard ethanol waste, and record date of ethanol rinse on sorting datasheet
- STEP 2 Remove vertebrate bycatch, record relevant information on sorting datasheet or in webUI, and store vertebrate bycatch in 50 mL tubes with locality and determination labels. Fill tubes with enough 95% ethanol to submerge their contents.
- **STEP 3** Place vertebrate bycatch in labeled 50 mL tubes, with locality and determination labels. Fill tubes with enough 95% ethanol to submerge their contents.
- STEP 4 Transfer trap contents (specimens, labels, mesh filter) back into original Whir-Pak bag
- **STEP 5** Fill Whirl-Pak bag with enough 95% ethanol to completely cover its contents, and seal the bag (leaving as little air space as possible)
- **STEP 6** Store: 1) 50 mL tubes, and 2) Whirl-Pak bags from the same sampling bout (in an airtight container)

Sorting Ground Beetles from Invertebrate Bycatch

- STEP 1 Transfer contents of Whirl-Pak bag into 'sorting' dish
- STEP 2 Rinse mesh filter with 95% ethanol, over sorting dish; discard mesh filter when clean
- **STEP 3** Sort specimens into two temporary containers, one marked 'invertebrate bycatch' and the other marked 'carabids'. Make sure each container contains locality labels and enough 95% ethanol to keep its contents submerged
- STEP 4 Place invertebrate bycatch in labeled 50 mL tubes, with locality labels
- **STEP 5** Sort common and reliably identified ground beetles into labeled 50 mL tubes, with a locality and a determination label
- **STEP 6** Sort abundant morphospecies into labeled 50 mL tubes, with a locality and a determination label
- **STEP 7** Place all other, unsorted, carabid beetles into labeled 50 mL tubes, with a locality and a determination label
- **STEP 8** Fill all 50 mL tubes with enough 95% ethanol to submerge their contents, and store in the freezer (-20°C) or refrigerator (4°C)

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APPENDIX G Guide to Distinguishing the Family Carabidae

The suborder Adephaga includes ground beetles and some aquatic groups. Adephagan beetles are easily identified by the manner in which the last pair of legs articulates with the beetle's underside (**Figure 53**), as well as the tarsal formula (5-5-5; **Figure 54**). The former feature is denoted by the last pair of legs completely separating the first abdominal segment. The latter feature is denoted by each of the beetle's tarsi (or feet) being comprised of 5 segments. Foretarsus = 5 segments; midtarsus = 5 segments; hindtarsus = 5 segments.




Figure 43. Hind leg articulation in Adephaga and Polyphaga.




Figure 44. Tarsal formula of adephagan beetles.

Adephagan beetles of the family Carabidae are *usually* black and shiny, although they may also be metallically colored, and have large eyes, powerful legs, and large mandibles that fit their predatory life styles (**Figure 55**). Otherwise these beetles lack easily recognizable and distinct morphological features. However, several other families of adephagan beetles do have distinct morphological features, by which they can easily be identified as *not* carabids. Below are some



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descriptions and illustrations of these identifying features (**Figure 56 - Figure 61**), which will allow for the identification of non-carabid adephagans, (a.k.a. invertebrate bycatch).




Figure 45. Four ground beetle specimens with head and pronotum labeled (first three) and showing the metallic coloration that is common in tiger beetles.

Family Gyrinidae:

Gyrinid beetles are most easily recognized for their divided compound eyes (**Figure 56**). Each of these beetles' eyes has a top (or dorsal) and bottom (or ventral) portion, such that their two eyes actually look like four. In addition, gyrinids have short, paddle-like mid and hind legs (**Figure 57**).



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


Figure 46. Lateral view of a beetle in the family Gyrinidae, showing dorsal and ventral portions of the compound eye.

Family Dytiscidae:

Dytiscid beetles are recognizable by their oval bodies and the long hairs on their hind tibia (**Figure 58**), by which their hind legs become oar-like structures for movement through water.


Figure 48. Dorsal view of a beetle in the family Dytiscidae, showing the oval shape of the body and long hairs on the hind legs.

Family Haliplidae:

Haliplid beetles are most easily recognized by their unusually large hind coxal plates(**Figure 59**), which cover most of the ventral side of the abdomen (and actually obstruct the view of the adephagan-specific hind leg articulation described above).

Family Noteridae:

Noterid beetles have smooth, oval bodies, and range in color from light brown to dark, reddish brown. Their heads are small, and they have a distinct 'noterid' platform, or plate between the second and third sets of legs on their ventral side (**Figure 60**).





Figure 50. Diagram and photo of a noterid beetle, showing the noterid plate between the second and third pairs of legs, on the ventral side.

Family Rhysodidae:

Rhysodid beetles have elongated bodies, beadlike antennae, protona that narrow to a 'neck' before joining with the head, and heads, protona, and elytra bearing deep longitudinal grooves (this being their most distinguishing feature; **Figure 61**).



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

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APPENDIX I Locality Labels

Locality labels are used to identify when and from where a sample was collected. They are used in the field to label traps, and in the laboratory to label whole samples and individual mounted specimens. Locality labels include particular information in order to be consistent with collection records from other global campaigns (see **Figure 43**; details to follow). At NEON we are using locality labels for samples containing ground beetles, mosquitoes and ticks.

The locality label-sheet has 8 columns, each with 27 labels. Each column of labels is identical and contains the information for one plot and one month. If more than 27 labels per plot are needed, print additional copies of this document.

I.1 COMPILE LABEL DATA

- 1. Compile the label data for all relevant plots in a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet.
 - a. Enter label data into a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet (**Figure 44**) with one column for each piece of information required for the locality label, as follows:
 - i. Column Header = "State", content = The state in which the sample was collected, in all capital letters
 - ii. Column Header = "County", content = The county in which the sample was collected, with the county name capitalized, followed by "County" (without quotes)
 - iii. Column Header = "Period", content = "." (without quotes)
 - iv. Column Header = "Site", content = The abbreviated site name. Instructions for generating this abbreviated site name are as follows (with examples in Table 16):
 - A. Use the following standardized abbreviations for words in the list below:




Figure 53. Example of spreadsheets containing information for locality labels, including the "plotID" field for locality labels that will be used in the field (A) and the "Day" and "Trap Code" fields for labels that will be used to pin/point/store insect specimens (B).

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
- 2. Name the sheet using a meaningful name such as 'BetLoc2014'. Save and close the file if you do not close the file, the Mail Merge may not work correctly.
 - a. Note it may be helpful to create one locality label document for labels to be used in the field, and another for labels to be used for pinning/pointing/storing insects. In such cases, name the files appropriately (e.g., 'BetFieldLoc2014' and 'BetPinLoc2014').

1.2 EXPORT THE DATA INTO MICROSOFT WORD USING MAIL MERGE

- 1. Open a Microsoft Word document and under **Mailings**, select **Start Mail Merge** and then select **Labels**.

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


Figure 54. Dimensions for creating a locality label template in Microsoft Word

- 4. A "Select Table" pop-up window (**Figure 46**) will appear, showing a list of the sheets within the Excel workbook created in step (**I.1**). 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


Figure 55. Selecting recipients from a Microsoft Excel file during Mail Merge

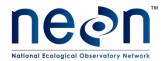

- 7. Confirm that the first row in each label starts with the state, the date information starts on a new line, and the plotID OR Trap Code starts on a new line.
- 8. In the **Mail Merge** menu, select **Finish & Merge**, then **Edit Individual Documents**. A pop-up menu will appear. Choose the 'All' option. This will create a Microsoft Word document with the labels.
- 9. Save the document. Use a meaningful name such as 'BetLoc2014'.
 - a. Note it may be helpful to create one locality label document for labels to be used in the field, and another for labels to be used for pinning/pointing/storing insects. In such cases, name the files appropriately (e.g., 'BetFieldLoc2014' and 'BetPinLoc2014').
- 10. Copy and paste each label as needed, in order to generate additional locality labels for samples and/or specimens and/or storage containers. Group all labels for the same plotID and/or Trap Code within the same column.
 - a. Note it may be helpful to paste the same label all of the way down an entire column, as several identical locality labels are required for containers during



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trapping and sorting, and for pinned/pointed specimens that were captured from the same traps at the same times.

I.4 PRINT LABELS

- 1. Print the labels on ethanol-safe archival paper (e.g., Bioquip 1223RA).
- 2. Determine how many labels are needed for each plot for the selected activity (see **Table 6**). If more than one page of labels per plot are required, print the document multiple times until enough labels are printed.
- 3. **NOTE:** The calculations and quality checks listed below for field work are based on current plans. If the schedule or frequency of trapping changes, the numbers will have to be recalculated using the following formula:

A = # of labels/trap

B = # of traps/plot

C = # of trap collections/plot during a month

D = # of labels needed/plot during a month

E = # of strips of labels needed

1.5 CUTTING LABELS

Cut labels into long columns using a snap-off blade knife and ruler. There should be no obstructions on the cutting mat or the ruler while doing this. Using a snap-off blade is essential to making clean cuts. Using scissors to make a cut of this length is highly prone to error.

1. Cut labels with as little white space on all sides of the text as possible (Figure 47).




Figure 56. Example of a strip of labels, dashed lines indicate where the labels should be cut (when/if they are cut into individual labels)

- 2. These cuts result in many labels in a vertical strip.
- 3. Store labels in strips. When needed, cut individual labels across the row with scissors, leaving as little white space around the text as possible.
- 4. Use ethanol-safe pens whenever adding information to labels to ensure longevity of markings.



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APPENDIX J Determination Labels

Determination labels are used to label individual specimens (pinned, pointed, or stored individually in tubes or vials) or groups of pooled specimens of the same taxon with a species or morphospecies identification. These labels contain the following three lines of information: 1) The scientific name or morphospecies ID of the individual or group of individuals, 2) the first and middle initials and last name of the person who identified the individual or group of individuals (these following the letters "det."), and 3) the year in which the identification was made (see example in **Figure 48**).

J.1 COMPILE DETERMINATION LABEL DATA

- 1. Compile the label data in a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet.
 - a. Enter label data into a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet (**Figure 49**) with one column for each piece of information required for the determination label, as follows:
 - Column Header = "Species", content = scientific name or morphospecies ID for the taxon.
 - A. For scientific names: text needs to be italicized and with the first letter of the genus capitalized
 - B. For morphospeciesIDs: text should not be italicized
 - ii. Column Header = "det.", content = the characters "det." (with the period at the end and without quotes)
 - iii. Column Header = "Identifier", content =First and middle initials and last name of the person who identified the individual or group of individuals
 - A. Initials should be capitalized and followed by a period
 - B. Last names should be capitalized
 - C. All initials should be separated by a space, and there should be a space between the middle initial and the last name



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iv. Column Header = "Year Identified", content =The year in which the identification was made, in numeric format (e.g., 2013)






Figure 59. Dimensions for creating a determination label template in Microsoft Word

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


Figure 60. Selecting recipients from a Microsoft Excel file during a Mail Merge

- 9. In the **Mail Merge** menu, select **Finish & Merge**, then **Edit Individual Documents**. A pop-up menu will appear. Choose the 'All' option. This will create a Microsoft Word document with the labels.
- 10. Save the document. Use a meaningful name such as 'BetDet2013'.
- 11. In the Microsoft Word document, italicize scientific names (but not morphospeciesIDs).
- 12. Copy and paste each label as needed, in order to generate the required number of labels for specimens of each taxon. Group all labels for the same taxon within the same column.
- 13. Re-save the document after editing

J.4 PRINT LABELS

- 1. Print the labels on ethanol-safe archival paper (e.g., Bioquip 1223RA).
- 2. Cut the labels as detailed in APPENDIX I



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APPENDIX K IndividualID Labels

individualID labels are used to label individual (pinned, pointed, or stored individually in tubes or vials) specimens from a specific location and sampling period. The label format is: MOD.DXX.######, where MOD is the module (in this case "BET" for beetles), XX is the domain number, and the number contains 6-digits (see example in **Figure 52**).

K.1 INDIVIDUALID SPECIMEN LABELS

Note that the individualID label omits the "NEON" prefix that is part of an individualID. This is to save space on the label.

- 1. Use the Microsoft Excel file titled "Insect Individual ID Labels"
 - a. "Domains" (first) tab of the file: This tab contains the correctly formatted domainIDs, which are the first component of the individualID labels. Select the domain ID that corresponds to the location in which labels are being printed.
 - b. "BET_IndividualID" (second) tab: Each page in this tab contains a total of 329 individualID labels. The column width is 0.91", row height is 0.21", font is Calibri size
 7. All the borders are turned ON around each cell borders will help keep straight lines when cutting out the labels.
 - i. The first 6 pages (through label 001974) have already been created, although the domainID may need to be altered to reflect the correct location. To do this:
 - A. Select all labels on all pages in the "BET_IndividualID" tab
 - B. In the "Find and Replace" menu, select the "Replace" tool
 - C. In the "Find what" box, type "D15" (without quotes)
 - D. In the "Replace with" box, type "DXX" (without quotes and where XX is the correct domain number)
 - E. Click the "Replace All" button



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- ii. When ready to print, be sure to *only print one* copy of each page, starting with the first page and not printing the second page until after all labels from the first page have been used.
 - This ensures that the same individualID is **NEVER** used for more than one specimen, regardless of where or when specimens are captured (e.g., through all years of sample collection, individual ID labels are **never** to be used more than once per domain).
- iii. Keep careful track of the page of labels, and pay close attention to the last number used during the previous bout of printing individualID labels, even if that bout was in a previous sampling year.
- iv. More label pages will be added to the "Insect Individual ID Labels" spreadsheet in future years, as requested.
- 2. Insert a sheet of yellow cardstock into the manual feed tray of the printer. Select all labels on the page of individualID labels to be printed. Under the print menu, select "Print Selection". Under Printer Properties, set the Paper source to Manual Feed.
- 3. Cut the labels as detailed in APPENDIX I
